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
"Among environmental factors in Europe, environmental noise leads to a disease burden that is second in magnitude only to that from air pollution" (WHO)







Health of more than 100 million people in the EU is seriously affected









Environment Action Programme to 2020 'Living well, within the limits of our planet'

- significantly decrease noise pollution in the Union,
- moving closer to levels recommended by the WHO,
- > by 2020







➤ Directive 2002/49/EC assessment and management of environmental noise

Requires: noise mapping

action planning

Excludes: limit values

prescribed measures







Is the Directive fit for purpose?







Objectives:

- 1. Common approach against noise
- 2. Inform source legislation

Are still relevant!





Common mapping method agreed

to allow for a single assessment for each dwelling



- to better inform legislation at source
- by collecting high quality, detailed & comparable exposure data
- > and to allow health impact assessment





Administrative costs 0,18 €/inhabitant







COST 1 €



BENEFIT 29 €







The Directive is generally fit for purpose...

...but not yet delivering the EU added value that it could provide



Implementation Findings





Directive fully transposed

➤ Majority of MS (21) have noise limit values

▶13 MS have designated quiet areas

Public consultation of Noise Action Plans to be improved

 - Urban planning
 - MS to seek EU Funds for their activities
- Make better use of the data
- Commission to engage with stakeholders on future noise policy (first meeting 30 Nov 2017)
